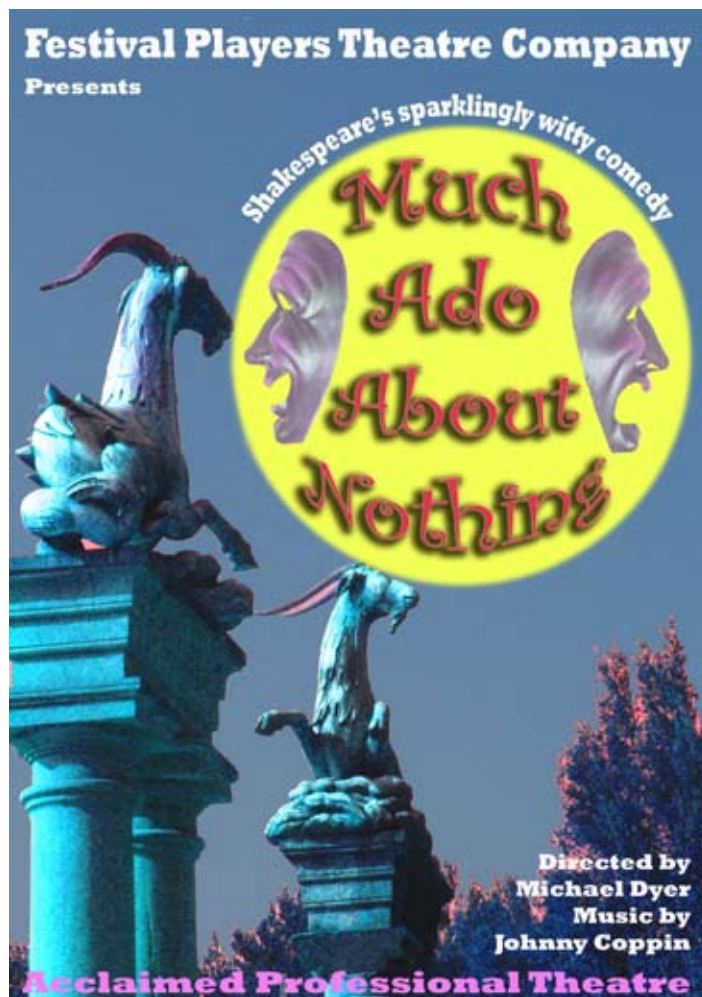

Laura Owen tells us about an interesting soft tissue surgery case

Charlie Powell, a two year old Golden Retriever, was originally referred to the soft tissue surgery department for further investigation of urinary incontinence. He had only been with his new owner for three months having been sold to them by the breeder as a failed stud dog. He had previously lived outdoors and the incontinence had not been noticed, but his condition soon became apparent as he was constantly dripping urine around the house. Fortunately for Charlie, his new owner was determined to investigate and treat his condition. She was both worried and surprised when the examination by her vet revealed a very large mass within Charlie's abdomen and they advised referral to Langford for further investigations.



Clinical examination at Langford confirmed the large mass within Charlie's abdomen, in the position of the left kidney. Abdominal ultrasound was used to investigate the mass further and this revealed a large, fluid-filled left kidney, with no remaining normal architecture and a dilated and tortuous ureter travelling from the kidney to the

bladder. Radiographic contrast studies of the urinary tract (injections of dye) were also performed, which confirmed these findings. The right kidney and ureter fortunately appeared to be normal. These findings were consistent with a diagnosis of left hydronephrosis (urine retention within the kidney capsule or the kidney) and hydroureter, caused by the left ureter entering the bladder in an abnormal location which would have been present from birth. In Charlie's case the secondary changes seen were much more extreme than usual, due to the delay in investigation of his problem.

After corrective surgery Charlie continued to do well at home for 48 hours after discharge, but subsequently suffered an acute deterioration in his condition and returned to Langford as an emergency. This time, on presentation, Charlie was dull

and depressed and showed signs of sepsis and shock. Intravenous fluids, antibiotics and pain killers were given overnight and Charlie was intensively monitored due to his critical condition. The next day his condition had improved and stabilised, but surgery was urgently required to prevent relapse.



At surgery we found that the enlarged left kidney had started to rupture, hence causing his sudden illness. The entire left kidney and ureter needed to be removed;

this was challenging, but proceeded without complications. After removal, the left kidney weighed approximately 1.5kg and Charlie must have felt a lot lighter!! Due to the excessive size it had been compressing his stomach and intestines and his appetite was much improved immediately following surgery!

Charlie remained hospitalised in the intensive care unit for three days and was then back to the normal lively dog he had been. He was discharged with a course of antibiotics and pain killers and once his stitches had been removed he was allowed to resume his usual level of activity. Mrs Powell was delighted with the outcome of Charlie's surgery; he was much brighter and more active than before and his incontinence problem had been completely resolved.
